Internet Legal Disputes

Cyberspace, Internet and online activities have generated fertile new ground for disputes and litigation. While there are many concepts familiar to the experienced practitioner, each area has its own quirks and requirements. In addition, it is rapidly evolving both technically and legally.

This is the first of a series of practical legal workshops run by the Baker & McKenzie Cyberspace Law and Policy Centre at the UNSW Law Faculty to assist practitioners to handle the range of cyberspace and Internet legal issues and disputes.

It is aimed at new or existing practitioners interested in cyberspace law, and will cover how to handle disputes in four topical areas:

1. domain names
2. online intellectual property
3. e-commerce
4. electronic privacy

In each area, you will be provided with a background of the relevant laws, principles and legal frameworks in the area, then we'll explore the practical issues in handling a dispute.

We focus on a guide to the procedural aspects of conducting a case, so we work through hypotheticals and practical examples, and provide tips by our expert speakers on how to manage a dispute for either party in an effective way.
